planned changes:

Long-term, are you planning to do any additions to your family, house, fences, driveway, decking, or patio? Do you have kids or pets? Are you considering adding a pool (or taking one out)? In what ways will the planned changes affect how you use your landscape?

garden inhabitants:

Who will be using the yard and at what time of day or year? Do you think you'll be out in it during the winter? How do you want to use the space: to entertain, to relax, to play, to work? Do you want to grow vegetables or have fruit trees? Do you have pets that need room in the yard—a dog run, for instance, or a chicken coop?

landscape
maintenance:

Are you planning to keep up the yard yourself, or do you plan to hire someone to maintain it? If you plan to hire someone, what level of expertise do you expect from your gardener—mow and blow or something more skilled? If you plan to maintain the landscape yourself, what maintenance tasks do you prefer, and what do you hate to do? For instance, you might say, "I don't like weeding," or "I love to deadhead flowers so they bloom longer." How much time per month do you think you will want to spend on maintaining the yard?



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budget: We don't need a specific number, but what order of magnitude do you expect to spend to install your landscape—\$10,000? \$50,000? \$100,000? Landscapes that have a lot of hardscape (paving, shade structures, kitchens, water features) tend to be more costly than those that are primarily plants. The size of the garden also affects cost. You can expect to spend *at least* \$10/square foot on installation in planting areas, \$15-25/square foot (or higher) for hardscape, depending on what materials you choose and whether the feature requires a lot of skilled labor. You can limit your costs by choosing to limit your scope to just a part of your yard.

existing features: What do you like and dislike about the yard as it is? Are there areas that have been problems in the past? Are there activities you would like to pursue in the yard that you are currently unable to do given the way the yard is laid out?

garden style: Is there a particular style of garden you'd like to have—contemporary, for instance, or Mediterranean? Walking around your neighborhood, are there any gardens that you really like? What catches your eye about them? Are there particular colors that draw you or repel you?
